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This report has been written to address what is categorised under Schedule 3 of the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) (Amendment) (England) Regulations 1999.

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INSTRUCTIONS TO THE LOCAL PLANNING AUTHORITY

After pre-application consultation advice and in line with the requirements of the new legislation, CMS UK is seeking a screening opinion under section 5(2) of the EIA regulations referred to above.

1. INTRODUCTION

CMS UK - Rural, Business and Renewable Energy Consultants with a nation wide customer base, have been asked to prepare a planning application for the proposed wind turbine at Nothill Farm.

The reasons for this development proposal are as follows:

- 1) Rising cost of energy being a huge burden on the business.
- 2) Secure future employment on the farm through reducing energy bills.
- 3) Reduce farms dependency on Fossil Fuels.
- 4) Form of farm diversification and to counteract the rising costs of electricity.
- 5) Increased awareness of climate change and the needed response to this matter
- 6) The **Kyoto Protocol** 1997 the UK is committed to reducing its green house gas (GHG) emissions by 12.5% between 2008 and 2012 (against a 1990 baseline figure).
- 7) Farming has been targeted as both part of the problem and solution of GHG emissions as it produces about 8% of the emissions in the UK, increased pressure from the government for farmers to reduce their **carbon footprint**.
- 8) Increased pressure from EU budget review and the EU Commissioners reporting that the CAP reform 2013 will bring about a change to the CAP criteria, and changing the payments to reflect the CAP objectives - climate change and ecoservices.

In line with similar schemes and previous EIA screening dealt with by CMS UK, the scale, appearance and location of the proposed wind turbine are such that CMS UK does not believe that the proposal will require an EIA.

CMS UK would like to make the planning authority aware that one of the main benefits of wind turbines is that they have little environmental impact. They are <u>not a permanent</u> structure in the same sense as a building for example. Once the turbine ceases to produce electricity it can be removed and the land can, if required, be returned to its former condition.

2. PROJECT CHARACTERISTICS

It is proposed to install a single Endurance wind turbine on the land at Nothill Farm, Crakemarsh, Uttoxeter, Staffordshire, ST14 5AT. Grid reference: SK 0750337735

Installing a single wind turbine at Nothill Farm is considered the best option for renewable energy production, a primary reason being that the site has a very good wind speed. The Department of Energy and Climate Change wind speed figure for this site at 25m above ground is 5.7m/s a "good/excellent" wind speed for the proposed wind turbine. An anemometer has been on site for two weeks, at the time of writing this report. The current reading is 3.5m/s (average). It must be noted that this is at a height on 15m. This anemometer will remain on site until the installation of the wind turbine.

The wind turbine is proposed to be a height of 36m therefore the wind speed will increase at this height.

2.1 SIZE AND SCALE

The proposed wind turbine has a hub height of 36m, with three blades measuring a radius of 9.6m. The final base of the turbine will only occupy an area of less than 4m by 4m.

2.1.1 SCALE OF CONSTRUCTION WORKS

The application area that will be disturbed during construction of the base and tower will be less than 0.065 Ha (0.16 acres). On completion of construction any disturbed area will be reinstated to full agricultural use.

The green dotted line on the location plan (appendix 1) indicates the access route for delivery of the turbines, towers and foundations. As shown the access from public highway will be through the farm buildings, along an existing track into the field. Conditions and routes across the field suitable for heavy equipment are well understood. As the access is steep and to prevent damage to the field the applicant is to proposing to lay a hard-core track into the field to the wind turbine site, which will later be used as a cow track.

It should be noted that there is no requirement for a regular vehicle access to the turbine site other than for delivery and installation of the foundations and the wind turbine itself.

The installation will not take place until site conditions make it easy to use this route across the field.

2.2 APPEARANCE

The Endurance 55kW wind turbine is a tubular steel tower painted white and fully protected against corrosion. The wind turbine is unique in design, and has a smooth appearance. The Appendices attached shows the elevations of the wind turbine.

2.2 CUMULATIVE EFFECT

Paragraph 21 of PPS22 refers to the need to take account of the cumulative effect of any wind generation project.

Cumulative Effect:

"The impact in which a series of wind turbines have an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects, when the relationship between the two can be expressed in linear form".

There are no other exiting wind turbines in this area that would cause concern for cumulative impact. No other turbines are visible from the site, or from prominent long distance views towards the site.

2.3 POLLUTION AND WASTE

There is no known pollution generated from the operation of a wind turbine. Wind Turbine foundation soil displacement will be levelled within the field boundary and cultivated as part of the field. The design of the foundations minimises the amount of excavation and concrete required for the base.

3. LOCATION OF THE DEVELOPMENT

The exact location of the turbine is shown in the site map, attached to this document as Appendix 1. The wind turbine is approximately 355 meters from the connection point, creating fewer disturbances to install the cabling. The turbine is well away from any public road.

3.1 EXISTING LAND USE

The applicant owns and occupies the land under and surrounding the proposed turbine (shown in Appendix 1). The land is intensively farmed, and is currently sown as a grass ley. Once the turbine has been constructed any disturbed area will be returned to full agricultural use.

3.2 LANDSCAPE CHARACTER

Key Points:

- On appearance the land appears to be gently undulating farmland with dispersed pattern of farmsteads, villages and commercial development. The agricultural landscape is arable/pasture which has been intensively farmed for years. The fields are enclosed, bounded by in most cases Staffordshire hedges or fencing. However;
- 2) The agricultural character of the area is being affected greatly by residential development and urban sprawl.
- 3) Busy roads now dominate the landscape, such as the A50 to the south of the proposed wind turbine site
- 4) Nothill Farm is hidden from view due to the topography and natural screening. The only view of the farm is a window to the north.
- 5) Electricity pylons and telegraph poles spread out across the landscape, puncturing the skyline.

All these characteristics of the landscape make the area less sensitive to the instillation of a single wind turbine; as such development is mitigated by what already exists in the landscape.

3.3 LANDSCAPE DESIGNATIONS

The proposed location is <u>not</u> in an AONB, SSSI, National Nature Reserve, Special Protection Area, Special Area of Conservation, or near to any scheduled monuments. There no wetland habitats in the near vicinity of the proposed turbine location.

A Phase One habitat Survey has been carried out by Staffordshire Ecological Records Centre (Staffordshire Wildlife Trust) on 8th March 2011 on a 1 kilometre radius application site. The survey showed that the site the does not benefit from any special designations with regard to protected species or site special scientific interest.

CMS UK has chosen this specific location through following expertise guidelines set out by Natural England. Because of this careful consideration it is felt that the wind turbine will have no negative impact on any wildlife.

4. CONCLUSION

CMS UK concludes that an EIA for this development <u>would not</u> be necessary. Firstly the proposal is for a small development - a single wind turbine where little disturbance for construction work is needed.

There will be no cumulative effect with other wind turbines. Taking into consideration other developments in the area, commercial development, the large electricity masts and pylons, and the residential development, any potential impact which the wind turbine would cause is mitigated by all of these elements which currently exist on in the landscape.

The development causes no waste, pollution or hazardous substances. It is a "clean" development which is benefiting the environment through producing renewable electricity by using a natural resource – wind.

The existence of a single wind turbine will have little impact on biodiversity or wildlife. The Phase one habitat survey shows that the site the does *not* benefit from any special designations with regard to protected species or site special scientific interest. The turbine is at a height that wildlife on the ground will not be affected.

The development proposed does not fall within Schedule 1 of the Regulations where an assessment is mandatory. However, the development falls within Schedule 2, Category 3 (b) as an installation for the harnessing of wind power for energy production. The proposal equals the 2 or more wind turbine threshold, and the 15 metre turbine height threshold laid down by the above regulations beyond which an Environmental Statement may be required.

Circular 2/99:

In respect of Schedule 2 development, an assessment will only be required if the development is likely to have significant effects on the environment by virtue of factors such as its nature, size or location.

Paragraph 33 of Circular 02/99 indicates that the Secretary of State's view is that, in general, EIA will be needed for Schedule 2 developments in three main types of case:

- a. for major developments which are of more than local importance (e.g. wide ranging environmental effects);
- b. for developments which are proposed for particularly environmentally sensitive or vulnerable locations (paragraphs 36-40); and
- c. for developments with unusually complex and potentially hazardous environmental effects.

Circular 02/99 Annex A comments on indicative thresholds and criteria for identifying Schedule 2 development requiring an Environmental Statement:

Wind Farms

A14. The likelihood of significant effects will generally depend upon the scale of the development, and its visual impact, as well as potential noise impacts. EIA is more likely to be required for commercial developments of five or more turbines, or more than 5MW of new generating capacity.

Assessment:

In assessing the proposal in the context of the above, the Council's view is that it is not a major development of more than local importance. The proposed turbine is relatively small, having a hub height of 35.4 metres and a tip height of 46 metres. The proposed turbine has a relatively small generating capacity and would not contribute significantly to the National Grid.

The area immediately surrounding the site is relatively sparsely populated, and as such it is not considered that the proposal will result in significant noise impacts.

The site falls outside the definition of a "sensitive area" as set out by Regulation 2(1) of the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment)(England and Wales) Regulations 1999.

Taking the above into account, it is considered that the proposal is of local importance only and is unlikely to generate complex or unusually hazardous environmental effects.

Paragraph A14 of Circular 02/99 Annex A states that "EIA is more likely to be required for commercial developments of five or more turbines, or more than 5MW of new generating capacity". The proposal involves the installation of a single turbine with a generating capacity of 225KW. The proposal is therefore significantly below the threshold above which Circular 02/99 suggests an Environmental statement is more likely to be required.

In conclusion, the proposed development is not of more than local importance, does not affect a sensitive area and would not involve unusually complex or hazardous environmental effects. Having considered the proposal against the provisions of the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment)(England and Wales) Regulations 1999 and Circular 02/1999, it is not considered that an Environmental Statement will be required in this instance.

Wind Farms

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Assessment:

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The area immediately surrounding the site is relatively sparsely populated, and as such it is not considered that the proposal will result in significant noise impacts.

The site falls outside the definition of a "sensitive area" as set out by Regulation 2(1) of the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment)(England and Wales) Regulations 1999.

Taking the above into account, it is considered that the proposal is of local importance only and is unlikely to generate complex or unusually hazardous environmental effects.

Paragraph A14 of Circular 02/99 Annex A states that "EIA is more likely to be required for commercial developments of five or more turbines, or more than 5MW of new generating capacity". The proposal involves the installation of a single turbine with a generating capacity of 225KW. The proposal is therefore significantly below the threshold above which Circular 02/99 suggests an Environmental statement is more likely to be required.

In conclusion, the proposed development is not of more than local importance, does not affect a sensitive area and would not involve unusually complex or hazardous environmental effects. Having considered the proposal against the provisions of the Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment)(England and Wales) Regulations 1999 and Circular 02/1999, it is considered that the proposal will not result in any significant effects on the environment and therefore an Environmental Statement will not be required in this instance.


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
