<b>B1</b> What is the Decision?	To award a capital grant of £26,000 to Princess Street Training Education and Enterprise Centre following the panel approval of an application to the Council's Ward Enhancement Programme, funded by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.
B2 What are the reasons for the Decision?  B2 Alternative options considered and rejected?	The Ward Enhancement Programme (WEP) was approved by Cabinet in September 2023 and created a £1.5m funding programme, financed by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), through which communities across the Borough could access capital funding to deliver projects in their local areas that improve prosperity, heritage or tourism.
	The WEP operates on an application basis whereby local community groups and other organisations can apply for capital funding with their application being considered and reviewed by a Member panel comprised of 5 Councillors and chaired by the Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Development.
	At the panel meeting on 11 <sup>th</sup> July 2024, an application was approved for the delivery of a project titled: The Local Initiative, which aims to do the following:
	To modernise and create easier accessibility to all parts of the training centre to be rented out to the community.
	Specifically to install a new lift to support people with disabilities to access the first floor of the building as the current lift isn't fit for purpose and to fit screed on top of the new flooring that's been installed to protect it from damage.
	A grant award of £26,000 was approved for this project, subject to the taking of this Executive Decision by the Cabinet Member.
<b>B3</b> What are the contributions to Corporate Priorities?	The delivery of the Ward Enhancement Programme primarily contributes to the priority of Creating a Prosperous East Staffordshire, Protecting our Heritage, and Standing up for our Communities.

The main financial issues arising from this decision are as follows:

The funding approved for this project is entirely capital and must be spent by March 2025, in line with the Government's requirements for the UKSPF.

The funding is provided through a grant agreement and paid in advance of the project in order to finance its delivery. If the project requires any co-funding, proof of this being secured will be reviewed prior to any funding being released by the Council. The funding is released in instalments agreed with the applicant. Supplier's invoices requested with proof of payment in the form of bank statements. A site inspection is also undertaken.

If the project/works aren't undertaken as outlined and agreed in the approved application (or any minor amendments agreed with the local authority beforehand) then there is possibility of a clawback occurring if the grant hasn't been spent in accordance with the application.
